At the very least, we should expect the Labor Government to implement its policies. How quickly that will happen is unclear. Indications of slowed progress are emerging. For starters, there is a mountainous backlog of a million visa applications clogging up the already dysfunctional department that is Home Affairs.

Home Affairs 'sources' and is inclined to repeat the crude political manoeuvre of election day, when a convenient boat arrival was announced despite pushback from public servants adhering to caretaker government convention.

If the Government is to be motivated to do more than is in Labor's policy platform "bible", it will only be when individual MPs argue for it in the party room due to the constant pressure they are under from their own constituents. This helps set the strategic direction for Grandmothers for Refugees.

Rather than a post-election tiring, our movement is growing. Two new groups have started in WA, increasing our ability to speak up for refugees with a national voice. Efforts are being made to connect scattered members in Queensland. Common sense suggests we focus on building the Grandmothers for Refugees presence in electorates held by government and independent MPs. Increasing connections with all Senators remains a strategic goal

To carry the movement through its next phase, a new Grandmothers for Refugees Executive group has been elected. You will find more about the new executive in this July Newsletter along with more about key issues affecting refugees.



Slow-Going in Home Affairs

The two years of border closures and zero migration appear now as a lost opportunity for the Home Affairs Department to get on with things.

The incoming government has found a backlog of one million visa applications to be processed, many from people already in the country and working. Nevertheless, the business community is pushing for more workers to be brought in from overseas. With the Jobs Summit in early September, expect the focus to be on new migration rather than giving willing refugees already here their chance to settle, work, and spend on rebuilding their lives as permanent residents.

When it happens as promised in the policy platform, the commitment to transfer around 19,000 people on temporary and safe haven enterprise visas to permanent visas will be a massive improvement for them. However, it appears these won't be done as a 'job lot' and will be dealt with individually, adding to the departmental workload. After ten years or more, there are still people indefinitely held in immigration detention. The new Immigration Minister, Andrew Giles, is understood to be reviewing these cases.

We know some things won't change. Boat turn-backs are still happening. Operation Sovereign Borders is here to stay. For the 'transitory persons' – all those who spent any time on Nauru or in PNG – there is still no softening on the ban on their settlement in Australia. Many are in their tenth year of hopelessness. Their imagined futures, even for families with children born in Australia, are still in the US and NZ under agreed deals, or perhaps Canada where only private sponsorship resettlements are currently possible.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese promised to govern with respect and kindness. That intention will likely be tested on a daily basis. In the meantime, we see welcome signs of a willingness to listen and talk with interest groups about their issues and be available to the media.

Refusing to eat the Democracy Sausage!

Both former Prime Minister Scott Morrison and former Home Affairs Minister Karen Andrews have been severely criticised and accused of "**undermining democracy**".

On Friday, 22 July 2022, the Minister for Home Affairs Clare O'Neil received an internal departmental report on circumstances surrounding the politically convenient news that a boat with Sri Lankan asylum seekers aboard was attempting to reach Australia on election day.

News of the on-water matter was released and confirmed by the Prime Minister, breaching its own secrecy code that has kept citizens in the dark about vulnerable asylum-seeking refugees for almost a decade. The Liberal Party used the information to urge voters to choose the Coalition over Labor.

Below is a summary of the report's findings:

Dear Minister

On Tuesday 24 May 2022, the acting Prime Minister asked me to investigate the circumstances that led to the issuance of the public statement by the Joint Agency Task Force (JATF) Operation Sovereign Borders (OSB) concerning the interception of the Suspected Illegal Entry Vessel (SIEV) 915 on the day of the Federal Election, Saturday 21 May 2022. My report is enclosed. It assesses whether the actions taken by officials were in accordance with the *Guidance on Caretaker Conventions 2021*.

The *Guidance on Caretaker Conventions 2021* do not have the force of law and Departments and Agencies do not have the legal power to enforce their observance. It was for the responsible Minister to determine whether it was in the public interest for the details of the arrival and interception of SIEV 915 to be made public. In the absence of any statutory provisions governing the matter, the release of this information was a matter of administration in relation to which the Minister could give directions, having regard to their ministerial role.

The legitimate purposes for previous publications of interceptions have been considered to be for transparency and deterrence - particularly of the role publication plays in deterring the people smuggling trade. It was for the Minister to determine the purpose of the announcement.

We know that Uighur and Bangladeshi refugees in the Gatton area lack regular income support, decent housing, and work rights so there is a real and present need to take their case up with local MPs and Senators.
